

PROCEEDINGS

of the

FORTY-SIXTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE SARDIS ASSOCIATION OF OLD REGULAR BAPTIST THE CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST

In session Assembled with Rebecca Church, Mingo County, W. Va., September 9, 10, 11, 1938.

At the place where arrangements were made for the preaching, the services were introduced by Elder Asa Evans, followed by the introductory sermon delivered by Elder Ester Hopkins, Text: John 3-16—"God So Loved the World, etc."

Then the delegates assembled at the church house and after a short talk and song and prayer by Elder Leonard Oxley, the Association proceeded as follows:

1. Called for the letters from the several churches and received the letters and seated the delegates.

2. The Association then organized by electing Elder Hi Maynard as Moderator; Elder Ester Hopkins, Assistant Moderator; Elder Jonah Bevins, Clerk, and Brother R. L. Murphy, Assistant Clerk.

3. At the request of the Moderator the Rules of Decorum were read by the Clerk.

4. Called for newly organized churches and received none.

5. Called for letters from Sister-Associations and received as follows: New Salem by the hands of Elders Frank Hopkins, Squire Hamilton, Billie Moore, Hays Maynard. Letter in the hands of Elder Frank Hopkins.

9. Committee appointed to see that the stand be supplied with ministers and that peace is preserved around the stand: Brother Mosco Gilman, Elder Harrison Bevins.

10. Committee to arrange the ministry for Saturday consisting of one member from each church with the entire delegation of the Rebecca Church. Ministers as follows: First, Elders Perry Cline, Ruben Ryer, Frank Hopkins, Peter Oest; Friday night at church house, Elder Squire Hamilton, Howard Gilliam, Billie Moore.

11. Appointed Clerks to write letters to corresponding Associations.

12. Committee on arrangements consisting of one delegate from each church with the Moderators and Clerks with the corresponding Associations invited.

13. On motion by Brother Caudill Williamson, the Association adjourned until 9:00 o'clock Saturday morning.

11. Ordered that we print obituaries presented to the Brother Clerk at the close of the Association.

12. Ordered, that the treasurer pay the expense of the delegations visiting Sister-Associations, paying for the oil and gas.

13. Ordered that we advise ministers of our association not to marry people into adultry where either man or woman has a living wife or husband.

14. Shall we receive into our fellowship men having more than one wife or women having more than one husband?

ANSWER: We advise the churches not to receive into their fellowship any such, except those who have put away the companions for the cause of fornication and such cases to have the Gospel or Church evidence of same.

15. Ordered, that we contribute as much as two pages of our minutes to memorial and funeral meetings of deceased brothers and sisters.

16. We, the Sardis Association, do hereby advise the churches of our union to use discretion in setting apart men for the ministry as we believe that if a man is called to the ministry by the Spirit of God the same Spirit will fully manifest its work to the church to which this man belongs and will prompt such church to liberate the man; again we do advise the churches not to ordain any man to the ministry when such party make demand for such action, and further advise the

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churches that they be sure that a man has the gift of pread or exhortation before they lay hands on same. And afte has been liberated and set forth by the church to preach gospel and fails to exercise his gift we advise the churc which he belongs to deal with him and, if necessary, der his credentials.

17. Called on committee appointed to meet the Old Association relative to differences that separate correspon fellowship to report.

18. Report received. Committee discharged.

19. Ordered, that we make no further efforts to revive respondence with Old Zion Association and that we have pr in our minutes the order of last year which was presente them by committee composed of Elder Jonah Bevins and I Ester Hopkins.

1. We, the Churches of Jesus Christ, known as Re Baptist, composed of the New Salem, Union, Sardis, and K Associations, at our regular sessions in the year of one thou nine hundred and thirty-seven, each of the above Associa during the business hours of their sessions have under sideration the advisability or possibility of making an effo revive a Christian Correspondence and fellowship with various United Baptist Associations, Namely: Paint Union, Bethlehem, New Hope and Olive Associations, do hereby si the following propositions for consideration. Of the above n Churches of United Baptist Association, who will meet wit by delegated, authorized representatives at the Buffalo Cl of United Baptist, Johnson County, Kentucky, on Friday b the first Saturday in October, 1937.

First realizing that both we the Regular Baptist and U Baptist Brothers came from the same original Association at that time were the same identical people in Faith, Pri and Doctrine. And at that time and for many years there corresponded and had mutual fellowship, until discord du practices and indulgence and perhaps doctrine which things ered our fellowship and correspondence and at that time reasons before stated correspondence and fellowship was to destroyed and severed between us and the United Baptist . ciations.

2. We do not deem the name "Regular" nor "Un 7 essential and we are willing to allow the same name to exist if it pleases.

3. We will not fellowship open Communion and Sunday Schools taught or conducted through Secterian Literature, as we believe that the only Ordained medium by which men and women are taught is by God-Sent men Preaching under the Demonstration of the Holy Ghost, therefore, we strictly oppose any and all so-called auxiliaries of the Churches, also we denounce the use of what is known as Erected Alters or Mourners Benches, as we have neither example or precept of such in the New Testament Scriptures.

4. We feel quite sure it is not in harmony with the Scriptures for our brethren to enter into a Covenant with such unbelievers and as such conditions in the past have been detrimental to the progress of the Church, we say that we do not believe our brethren should be affiliated with secret Societies or Orders. We are opposed to the Doctrine as advocated by some of our United Baptist Brethren that they know beyond a doubt, personally, that they are saved, but we do believe that we are saved by Hope which hope is the anchor of the Soul Christ being our Hope.

5. We do not believe in partaking of other men's sins by preaching with and encouraging false Doctrine therefore, we will not labor with, nor in conjunction with, those who are not Orthodox in Doctrine and Practice.

20. Ordered, that we change Article Eleven (11) of our Articles of Faith to read as follows:

"We believe that feet washing is an example of Jesus Christ and ought to be observed and kept up by his Church until His second coming."

21. Ordered, that our next Association to be held with Turkey Creek Church, Turkey Creek, Pike County, Kentucky.

22. Ordered, that Elder Asa Evans preach the Introductory Sermon and that Elder Jonah Bevins be his alternate.

23. Ordered, that we tender our thanks to the Rebecca Church and to the community at large.

24. Ordered, that the minutes be read and signed by the Moderator and Clerk.

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The Association then adjourned to the time and place tioned above.

CONSTITUTION

From a long series of experiences, we the churches of Jesus Christ being regularly baptized upon our profession of faith in Jesus Christ are convinced of the necessity of a combination of churches in order to perpetuate a union and communion among us and preserve, maintain and keep the rules and orders of an Association according to the following form of government:

Article 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches and duly sent to represent in this association who shall be members whom they shall think best qualified for the purpose and producing letters from their respective churches certifying their appointment shall be entitled to seats.

Article 2. In the letters from the different churches shall be expressed their number in full fellowship, their baptised, received by letter, restored, dismissed, excommunicated and dead since the last Association.

Article 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage nor shall they infringe on the internal rights of any church in the union.

Article 4. The Association when convened shall be governed and ruled by a regular and proper decorum.

Article 5. The Association shall have a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

Article 6. New churches may be admitted into our union that shall petition by letter and delegate, and if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly shall be received by the Association and manifested by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.

Article 7. Every church in the Union shall be entitled to a representative in the Association.

Article 8. Every query presented by any church to the Association, being first debated by their own church, shall be taken up by the Association.

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Article 9. Every motion made and seconded shall be ta up by the Association except it be withdrawn by the mem who made it.

Article 10. The Association shall endeavor to furnish churches with the minutes of the Association.

Article 11. The church shall send money by the delegof each church for printing the minutes of the Association.

Article 12. There shall be a record book kept wherein proceedings of every Association shall be regularly recorded the Secretary appointed for that purpose.

Article 13. The minutes of the Association shall be r and corrected, if need be, and signed by the Moderator Clerk before the Association rises.

Article 14. Amendments of this plan or form of governm may be made at any time, by a majority of the Union, when t deem necessary.

Article 15. All matters coming before the Association sl be decided by the will of the majority.

Article 16. The Association shall have power: 1. To p vide for the general union of the churches. 2. To preserve inv lably a chain of communication among the churches. 3. To g the churches all necessary advice in matters of difficulty. 4. inquire into the cause when the churches fail at any time represent themselves at the Association. 5. To appoint any me ber by and with their consent to transact any business wh they think necessary. 6. The Association shall have power withdraw from any church in this union which shall violate rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodox princip of religion. 7. To admit any orderly minister of our order a seat with us in the Association. 8. The Association shall h power to adjourn themselves to any future time or place t may think most convenient to the churches of the union. 9. T no minister shall be ordained unless forwarded by the chu and it shall require two or more ordained ministers to comp a presbytery for that purpose.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

Article 1. We, the churches of Jesus Christ, called Regular Baptist, are constituted on the following faith, viz:

Article 2. We believe in only one true and living God, the Creator of heaven and earth and all things that are therein contained.

Article 3. We believe in Jesus Christ, the eternal Son of God, who is head and king of his church.

Article 4. We believe in the Holy Ghost the sealer and applier of the redemption purchased by Christ.

Article 5. We believe in the Father, Son and Holy Ghost and these three are one.

Article 6. We believe in the Old and New Testament Scriptures to be the infallible word of God and take it for our only rule of faith and practice and nothing is to be taken from or added to it.

Article 7. We believe in the free atonement of Jesus Christ, that He tasted death for every man and that salvation is to all men and women on the terms of the gospel.

Article 8. We believe that repentance and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ and regeneration are necessary previous to baptism, and that immersion is the only right way of administering the ordinance.

Article 9. We believe that Christ has but one true gospel church and that it will finally persevere through grace to glory.

Article 10. We believe in the communion of the Lord's Supper, that is, taking of the bread and wine by the church of Jesus Christ in commemoration of the death and suffering of the Son of God until His second coming.

Article 11. We believe that feet washing is an example of Jesus Christ, and ought to be observed and kept up by His Church until His second coming.

Article 12. We believe that Jesus Christ is the first resurrection from the dead and that He lives forever.

Article 13. We believe in the resurrection of the just and unjust.

Article 14. We believe the happiness of the saints and the punishments of the wicked are eternal.

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RULES OF DECORUM

Article 1. The Association to be opened and closed by pray Article 2. A Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by suffrage of the members present.

Article 3. Only one member shall speak at a time and shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator when he about to make a speech.

Article 4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrup in his speech except by the Moderator, till he is done speaki and shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect the person who spoke before or make remarks on mishaps, failu or imperfections, but shall verily state that cause and mat as nearly as he can so as to convey his light and idea.

Article 5. No person shall rise and speak more than the times on one subject without consent of the Association.

Article 6. No person shall abruptly break off or absent hi self from the Association without liberty obtained from it.

Article 7. No member of the Association shall have liberty of laughing during the sittings nor whisperings in ti of public speech.

Article 8. No member of this Association shall addr another by any other term or appellation other than that Brother.

Article 9. The Moderator shall not interrupt a member prohibit him from speaking until he gives his light upon t subject except when he breaks the rules of decorum.

Article 10. The names of the several members of the As ciation shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as oft as the Moderator requires.

Article 11. The Moderator shall have the same privile of speech as another member provided the chair be filled, I shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.

Article 12. Any member who shall wilfully and knowing

break any of the rules shall be reproved by the Association as it may think proper.

Article 13. The delegation to be seated in this Association shall be limited to three members from each church.

Article 14. No person shall speak more than five minutes at the same time without liberty obtained from the Association.
