PROCEEDINGS

of the

FIFTY-FIFTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE SARDIS ASSOCIATION OF REGULAR BAPTIST THE CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST

In session assembled with the Bethany Church, September 12, 13, 14, 1947, at the place where arrangements were made for the preaching. The services were introduced by Elder Grover Carey, followed by the introductory sermon delivered by Elder W. C. Hay. Text: 2nd Timothy, 4th Chapter and first Clause of the second verse, as follows: "Preach the Word," then the Association proceeded as follows:

- 1. Called for the letters from the several churches and received the letters and seated the delegates.
- 2. The Association then organized by electing Elder Ester Hopkins as moderator, Elder W. C. Hay as Assistant Moderator, also Elder W. C. Hay as Clerk, and Bro. Troy T. Francis as Assistant Clerk.
- 3. At the request of the Moderator, the rules of Decorum were read by the Clerk.
- 4. Called for newly organized churches and none responded.
- 5. Called for letters from Sister Associations and received as follows:

NEW SALEM. By the hands of Elders F. A. Hopkins, Tack Hall, Squire Hamilton, Solie Kiser, Billie Moore and Bro. Milford Adams. Letter in the hands of Elder Tack Hall.

PHILADELPHIA. Two letters presented which proved division among them. By motion letters rejected and advised them to return home and make peace.

UNION. By the hands of Elders S. T. Wright and James Green. Letter in the hands of Elder S. T. Wright.

MUD RIVER. By the hands of Elders Gilbert Miller, John Miller, Bros. John Tabor and George Miller. Letter in the hands of Elder J. W. Miller.

THORNTON UNION. By the hands of Elders G. Bennett Adams and Charley Cornette. Letter in the hands of Elder Charley Cornette.

- 6. Called for transient ministers and members of our faith and order. The following received: Elders H. C. Maynard, John Brown, Willie White, K. B. Bently and Fon Bowling.
- 7. Ordered that the Moderator make all temporary appointments.
- 8. Committees appointed to take care of the visiting brethren as follows: Elder Willie White and Bro. Riley Dillon.
- 9. On motion it is ordered that we correspond with the following Associations: New Salem, Union, Mud River and Thornton Union.
- 10. Committee appointed to see that the stand be supplied with ministers and that peace is preserved around the stand, consisting of Elder Willie White and Riley Dillon.
- 11. Committee to arrange the ministry for Friday night and Saturday, consisting of one member from each Church with the entire delegation of the Bethany Church. Ministers as follows: Friday Night, Bro. Rudolph Sesco; Second, Solie Kiser; Third, S. T. Wright, and Fourth, John Miller. For Saturday: First, Charley Cornette; Second, James Green; Third, F. A. Hopkins, and Fourth, G. Bennett Adams.

- 12. Appointed Clerks to write letters to corresponding Associations.
- 13. Committee on arrangements consisting of one delegate from each Church with the Moderators and Clerks, with the Coresponding Associations invited.
- 14. On motion by Elder E. S. Coleman, the Association adjourned until 9:00 o'clock Saturday Morning.

Saturday Morning

Met pursuant to adjournment and after Elder James Green from the Union Association made some wonderful remarks and led us in prayer the Association then proceeded as follows:

- 1. Called the roll and marked the absentees.
- 2. Read the Bill of Arrangements and discharged the committee on same.
- 3. Appointed a committee on finance consisting of Elders B. H. Bevins, Emmette Case and Willie Stanley, who reported the contributions from each church as shown in the statistical table.
- 4. Called on the Treasurer to report, who reported as follows:

- 5. Ordered that Elder Willis Blackburn be retained as Treasurer and that he be allowed \$10.00 for his service.
- 6. Ordered that the Clerk superintend the printing of the minutes, and that he have 3,000 copies printed, and that he be allowed \$15.00 for his service for preparing manuscript and recording the same.
- 7. Brethren called in Union meetings and Associations last year made their reports. Their reports received, failures excused. They all were admonished to be more faithful this coming year.
- 8. Appointed same committee to arrange for preaching Saturday night, and Sunday, who reported as follows: Saturday night: First, Elder Asa Evans; Second, Tracy Hatfield, and Third, Wallace Maynard. Sunday: First, Elder J. C. Thornsbury; Second, Gilbert Miller; Third, B. H. Bevins, and Fourth our Moderator, Elder Ester Hopkins closed the service.
- 9. Letters to Sister Associations read and Delegates appointed as follows

New Salem—To be held with the Little Creek Church, Iaeger, Pike County, Ky. To begin on Friday before the fourth Saturday in September, 1947. Elders H. C. Maynard, J. G. Thornsbury, B. H. - 12. Ordered that we advise Ministers of our Association not to marry people into Adultery where either Man or Woman has a living wife or husband.
- 13. Shall we receive into our fellowship Men having more than one wife or Women having more than one Husband?

Answer: We advise the Churches not to receive into their fellowship any such except those who have put away their companion for the cause of fornication and such cases to have the Gospel or church evidence of same.

- 14. By Motion it is ordered that a picture of Elder Hi Maynard, the Obituary written by himself, a letter to his Brethren and a song composed by him in his last days be printed in our minutes.
- 15. Ordered that we draw \$32.35 from our treasury to pay the balance on monument purchased for Elder Hi Maynard by the Association.
- 16. Ordered that our next Association be held with Dix Fork Church, Canada, Pike County, Ky., on the Wil-

liamson-Pikeville highway. To begin on Friday before the second Saturday in September, 1948.

- 17. By vote it is ordered that Elder B. H. Bevins preach the introductory sermon and that Elder Emmette Case be his Alternate.
- 18. Ordered that we tender our thanks to the Bethany Church and the Community at large.
- 19. Ordered that the minutes be read and signed by the Moderators and Clerks.
- 20. On motion we adjourned to the time and place above mentioned.

OBITUARIES

Elder Hi Maynard

Elder Hi Maynard born in Pike County, Ky., on April 19th, 1874. Came to West Virginia in 1891 and began teaching in the Public school at the age of 16, in Logan County, (now Mingo.)

Was maried on September 27th, 1894 to Elizabeth Runyon, the youngest daughter of Squire A. L. Runyon, Sr. To this union there was born 11 children, all surviving except one, who passed on in infancy. The living children are: Mary Hall, J. A., A. J., Samuel, William C. and John H. Maynard, Brookie Hay, Nannie Butcher, Mae Adkins, and Mattie. Had 25 grandchildren, one great-grandchild and a host of relatives and friends to mourn his loss.

He united with the Regular Baptist Church of Jesus Christ in 1894, was baptized by Elder A. L. (Zan) Dempsey, and was ordained to preach the Gospel on the First Sabbath in July, 1895.

He was very studious in his Bible study and spent many years to study to shew himself approved unto God a workman that needeth not be ashamed rightly dividing the Word of Truth.

He was firm in his convictions, brief in his speech, persuasive and convicing in his discourses, but would yield if wrong.

His field of labor for the years was spent in West Virginia, Kentucky, Ohio, Virginia and North Carolina.

He helped to organize several Churches and was instrumental in the hand of God to point many poor souls to the "Lamb of God."

The wife of his youth suddenly passed on April 3, 1920, and left him with a large family of motherless children. He was married the second time to Mrs. Nannie Webb on January 3rd, 1921. She only lived until July 3rd, 1925, and his third marriage was to Mrs. Brookie Salmons on August 27th, 1926.

His last days were devoted almost entirely to his calling—Preaching the Gospel of the Saviour of all men and Special Saviour of those who believe.

He, in his last days, would go far and near to answer calls to preach, though burdened with disease and pain. He did not complain much. He enjoyed the Brotherhood of the Church, and believed it was the only institution for a child of God. He believed in the infallibility of the word of God and emphasized the Dictrine of the resurrection of the dead, also was a strong advocate of eternal Happiness of the Children of God, and everlasting punishment of the wicked and un-Godly.

He advocated the doctrine of Salvation by grace through faith in Christ Jesus; that faith justified, but grace saved.

He fully believed in the example of Jesus Christ—Feet washing, that it should be observed by his children, for in doing these things we are happy.

He was a firm believer in the Doctrine of a "visible" Kingdom or Church, and that it was organized and given its laws by its law giver Jesus Christ.

He believed in the final perseverance and the eternal victory of the Church, and in the resurrection the last enemy which is Death would be destroyed.

He refused to acknowledge any human head for the Church, believing that Christ was, is, and shall forever remain the Priest, Prophet, King and Head of the Church and through Him and by Him, and Him alone we have an access to God.

He ignored artificial and human plans for the Salvation of sinners, thereby contended that a man called of God could and would preach the Word and the Word was quick and powerful, and sinners were convinced of sin by the Holy Spirit.

He believed in the continuance of brotherly love in the Church and that if one member suffer all the members suffer, for we are members of the same body—the Body of Jesus Christ.

He delighted in the tranquility and peacefulness of the Church and was greatly disturbed when trouble arose among the children of God.

He believed that though miracles had passed yet the gift of healing by the prayer of faith was effectual as described by the Apostle James.

That the children of God should not forsake the assembling of themselves together for the purpose of worship, prayer and in love for the perpetuation of the lovely union and fellowship of the Church.

That we should constantly and earnestly contend for the faith once delivered unto the Saints, loving with pure hearts fervently both our Brethren and the Lord Jesus Christ, our Elder Brother, who was delivered for our transgressions and rose again for our justification.

Be thou faithful unto death.



CONSTITUTION

From a long series of experiences, we, the churches of Jesus Christ being regularly baptized upon our profession of faith in Jesus Christ, are convinced of the necessity of a combination of churches in order to perpetuate a union and communion among us and preserve, maintain and keep the rules and orders of an association according to the following form of government:

ARTICLE I. The association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches and duly sent to represent them in this association, who shall be members whom they shall think best qualified for the purpose. And, producing letters from their respective churches certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to seats.

ARTICLE II. In the letters from the different churches, shall be expressed their number in full fellowship, their baptized, received by letters, restored, dismissed, excommunicated and dead since the last association.

ARTICLE III. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they infringe upon the internal rights of any church in the union.

ARTICLE IV. The association, when convened, shall be governed and ruled by a regular and proper decorum.

ARTICLE V. The association shall have a Moderator and Assistant Moderator, a Clerk and Assistant Clerk, also a Treasurer, who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

ARTICLE VI. New churches may be admitted into our union that shall petition by letter and delegates, and if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the association and manifested by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.

ARTICLE VII. Every church in the union shall be entitled to a representative in the association.

ARTICLE VIII. Every query presented by any church to the association being first debated by their own church, shall be taken up by the association.

ARTICLE IX. Every motion made and seconded shall be taken up by the association, except it be withdrawn by the member who made it.

ARTICLE X. The association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of the association.

ARTICLE XI. The churches shall send money by the delegates of each church for printing the minutes of the association.

ARTICLE XII. There shall be a record book kept wherein the proceedings of every association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary appointed for that purpose.

ARTICLE XIII. The minutes of the association shall be read and corrected, if need be, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the association rises.

ARTICLE XIV. Amendments to this plan or form of government may be made at any time, by a majority of the union, when they deem necessary.

ARTICLE XV. All matters coming before the association shall be decided by the will of the majority.

ARTICLE XVI. The association shall have power:

- To provide for the general union of churches.
- To preserve invioably a chain of communication among the churches.
- 3. To give the churches all necessary advice in matters of difficulty.

- 4. To inquire into the cause when the churches fail at any time to present themselves in the association.
- To appoint any member by and with their consent to transact any business which they think necessary.
- 6. The association shall have power to withdraw from any church in this union which shall violate the rules of the association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.
- 7. To admit any orderly minister of our order to a seat with us in the association.
- 8. The association shall have power to adjourn themselves to any future time or place they may think most convenient to the churches of the union. That no minister shall be ordained unless forwarded by the church, and it shall require two or more ordained ministers to compose a presbytery for that purpose.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

ARTICLE I. We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of Heaven by instinction, that it has God for its Author; salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its mother; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us and, therefore, is and shall remain to the end of the world the true center of Christian union and the supreme standard by which all human conduct and opinions shall be tried.

ARTICLE II. That there is one and only one true and living God, whose name is Jehovah, the maker and the supreme ruler of Heaven and earth, inexpressible, glorious in holiness, worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love, revealed under the personal relation of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, equal in every divine perfection, and executing distinct, but harmonious, offices in the great work of redemption.

ARTICLE III. That man was created in a state of holiness under the law of his maker, but by voluntary transgression, fell from that holy and happy state, in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners, not by constraint, but by choice, being by nature utterly devoid of that holiness, required by the law of God, wholly given to the gratification of the world, to Satan, and their ever sinful passions, and, therefore, are under just condemnation to eternal ruin without defense or excuse.

ARTICLE IV. That the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace, the meditorial offer of the son of God, who took upon Him our nature yet, without sin honored the law by his personal obedience and made atonement for our sins by his death, being risen from the dead, he is entered into Heaven and uniting in his wonderful person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfection, is in every way

qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and an all sufficient Saviour.

ARTICLE V. That the great gospel blessing which Christ in his fullness bestowed in such as believe in him, is justified and that justification consist in the pardon of his sins and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness, that it is bestowed, not in condition of any works of righteousness we have done, but through his own righteousness.

ARTICLE VI. That the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the gospel, and that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial and obedient faith.

ARTICLE VII. That in order to be saved, we must be regenerated or born again, that regeneration consists in giving holy disposition to the mind and is effected in a manner above our comprehenson or calculation by the power of the Holy Spirit so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the Gospel, and its proper evidence is found in the holy fruit which we bring forth to the Glory of God.

ARTICLE VIII. That such only are real believers as endure to the end, that their preserving attachment to Christ is the ground work which distinguish them from superficial professors, that a special providence watches over their welfare and they are kept by the power of God, through faith unto salvation.

ARTICLE IX. That a visible Church of Christ is a congregation of Baptized believers associated by a covenant of faith in the Gospel, observing the ordinances of Christ's government by His law and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges in them by his work, that its only proper officers are bishops or pastors and deacons, whose qualification claims and duties are described in the Epistles of Timothy and Titus.

ARTICLE X. That Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, to a solemn and beautiful emblem

of our faith in a crucified and risen Saviour, with its purifying power that is presented to the privilege of a Church unto the Lord's supper in which the members of the church, by the use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ, preceded always by a solemn and self examination.

ARTICLE XI. We also believe that feet washing is a duty enjoined upon us to show our love for one another.

ARTICLE XII. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, both of the just and the unjust. Also that the happiness of the saints, and the punishment of the wicked are eternal.

RULES OF DECORUM

ARTICLE I. The association to be opened and closed by prayer.

ARTICLE II. The Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

ARTICLE III. Only one member shall speak at a time and he shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator when he is about to make a speech.

ARTICLE IV. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech, except by the Moderator, until he is done speaking, and shall strictly adhere to the subject, and in no wise reflect upon the person who spoke before, nor make remarks on mishaps, failures or imperfections, but shall verily state the cause and matter as nearly as he can, so as to convey his light and idea.

ARTICLE V. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on one subject without consent of the association.

ARTICLE VI. No person shall abruptly break off or absent himself from the association without liberty obtained therefrom.

ARTICLE VII. No member of the association shall have the liberty of laughing during the sittings nor whispering in the time of public speech.

ARTICLE VIII. No member of this association shall address another by any other term or appelation other than that of brother.

ARTICLE IX. The Moderator shall not interrupt a member nor prohibit him from speaking until he gives his light upon the subject, except when he breaks the rules of decorum.

ARTICLE X. The names of several members of the association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over so often as the Moderator requires.

ARTICLE XI. The Moderator shall have the same privilege of speech as another member; provided the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the association be equally divided.

Article XII. Any member who shall wilfully and knowingly break any of the rules shall be reproved by the association as it may think proper.

ARTICLE XIII. The delegation to be seated in this association shall be limited to three members from each church.

ARTICLE XIV. No person shall speak more than five (5) minutes at the same time without liberty obtained from the association.
